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Update 22: United States of America - Plans to Implement Negative COVID-19 Test Requirement on Arrival Starting January 26, 2021

- All air passengers bound for the US will require a negative COVID-19 test within three days of their departure, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) said on January 12, 2021
- 'Testing does not eliminate all risk but when combined with a period of staying at home and everyday precautions like wearing masks and social distancing, it can make travel safer,' said CDC Director Robert Redfield
- The policy will take effect on January 26, 2021, and expands on a previous testing rule that targeted Britain and came into effect in December 2020, following the emergence of a COVID-19 variant believed to be more transmissible
- The CDC also recommends that travelers get tested again three to five days after their arrival, and stay home for at least seven days
- Additionally, on January 12, 2021, the US reported 4,197 deaths, a record for the most COVID-19 deaths reported in one day since the start of the pandemic, according to data from Johns Hopkins University (JHU)
- Prior to January 12, 2021, the US had averaged more than 3,223 COVID-19 deaths a day over the past week, JHU data showed
- More than 9 million people have received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine and more than 27 million doses have been distributed, according to the CDC
- That means one-third of vaccines that have been delivered have been given to people
- As of now, the country reported 23,368,225 confirmed COVID-19 cases with 389,599 deaths, 1.7% of the total reported cases and 13,816,028 recoveries, 59.1% of the total reported cases
- When compared to the overall population of the country, confirmed COVID-19 cases and fatality rate stands at 7.04% and 0.12%. respectively

SUPPLY WISDOM Impact level Definitions

Impact Level	Definitions
Immediate	Certain - Supply Wisdom recommends considering prompt action. Examples of Immediate level alert events may include bankruptcy filings, data breaches, unexpected curfews, strikes, power black-outs, major geo-political events etc.
High	Highly likely to occur in the near term (within 3 months) - Supply Wisdom recommends being in a state of readiness to take quick action. Examples of High level alert events may include withdrawal of rating by ratings agencies, hostile takeover, multiple cyber-attacks, new business policies causing significant hardship etc.
Medium	Likely to occur in the mid-term (within 3 to 6 months) - Supply Wisdom recommends reviewing current mitigation steps and being ready to take proactive actions if and when situation deteriorates further. Examples of Medium level alert events may include unplanned C-level exits, suppliers caught in bribery cases, economy slipping into recession.
Low	Possible in the long-term (after 6 months) - Supply Wisdom recommends taking proactive action if situation does not resolve. Examples of Low level alert events may include lawsuits filed against suppliers, client losses, air pollution alerts issued by country's local authorities, unexpected holidays announced for the location etc.
Informational	The event is pertinent information but does not have a risk element associated with it. Examples of Info level alert events may include launch of new solutions, partnerships signed, industry outlook, positive changes in government policies, announcements regarding launch of software parks/ free trade zones/special economic zones etc.
